Fear and silence still pervade our schools, workplaces, and society. We are afraid to speak up. We fear what people will think. We fear putting our schooling, our jobs in jeopardy, and our reputations, regardless of our talents and skills for the work we do. I see it among my peers, and I see it as an educator. With the right measures in play, healing can happen. It is clear that with acceptance and compassion, we achieve higher levels of success in any school, in any profession. I lived it, I proved it, and now I share my story. I am a survivor. My name is Chris Nihmey. I was born and raised in Ottawa. I am a mental health advocate, author, presenter, and teacher. In 1998, I began my teaching career before succumbing to my various illnesses. I was diagnosed with Bipolar Disorder in 2001. Subsequently, I was diagnosed with Obsessive-Compulsive Disorder and Generalized Anxiety Disorder. I resigned from permanent teaching in 2000, a painful decision preventing me from moving forward in my life. For over a decade, I battled three life-debilitating illnesses. In combination, they nearly destroyed me. Knowing the extreme dangers of stigma in society, I made a decision to hide my illnesses, living only one side of my life in front of others. I hid behind an unexpected ally, writing, and found hope through words. Finally, after years of silence, I have found hope. Hear my story.

The Agnes Zabali Boys & Girls Club programs are designed to provide a safe and supportive place, where every child and adult is respected and valued in an environment of inclusion and acceptance. Our Canadian and local volunteers model hard work, honesty, fair play, positive attitude, cooperation and respect for self and others. We believe that all young people can grow into responsible, contributing and self-reliant members of a community. Children and youth are the centre of everything we do. By supporting basic health, education and through field trips and recreational activities, we encourage and empower the youth of Kamengo to develop healthy lifestyles, a life-long passion for learning, leadership, life skills and a sense of social responsibility.

We travel with experienced group leaders who have been part of these missions for some years including U Ottawa Professor Ruth Kane. We spend most of our time carrying out a series of education and sports programs at the community centre with a focus on English language development, computer skills, academic advancement, healthy living, leadership development and sports skill development. In addition we get involved in building repairs and maintenance to ensure that the centre is safe and sustainable. Supporting Student Inclusion: Focus on Social Emotional Learning VNR- Vanier Room 3075

In this interactive workshop, we explore a mental health promotion approach to increasing the inclusion of all students. We discuss how students can develop a number of skills and competencies, namely those related to social-emotional learning (SEL), which can reduce their chance of developing or worsening mental health difficulties.
